## WIDENING NET

ID NAB OWLINE SELLERS

Thousands under the microscope of ministry's new Cyberforensic Division

EALTH authorities, nov on an aggressive nation-wide crackdown to rid the heauty industry of unno tified and toxic beauty products, have widened their net to nab those selling such products on social media.

Thousands of sellers hiding behind the World Wide Web when peddling their products, including clearly out-lawed injectable beauty concoctions, have come under the microscope of the Health Ministry's newly established Cyberforensic Division.

Health enforcers, who have been storming kiosks and beauty parlours selling illegal and dubious products, have a list of errant online businessmen, who, based on their testimo nials and claims, have sold thousands of units each to consumers who have no idea that some of the products contain the deadly hydroquinone, among others.

Their modus operandi is similar,

and tailored to escape the law: they do not allow pick-ups and their operating addresses are not made pub-

And, any negative testimonial posted on their sites is swiftly deleted.

A source from the ministry said the en forcement team of the Pharmaceutical Services Divi sion, with the help of the Cyberforen sic Division, had been compiling information and evidence against these profit-driven online retailers, who are putting public health at serious risk.

"The cyberforensic team will come


out with profiles of those using social media to sell illegal cosmetics, including the injectable kind.

They will also zero in on these sellers' contact details and bank accounts.

"Banks and telcos will assist the team in securing these crucial details," said the source, adding that their addresses would be given to enforcers to carry out raids.

The authorities, said the source, would seek help from the Malaysian Communications and Multimedia Commission to block sites that promote or sell unnotified products.

Enforcers from the Pharmaceutical Services Division have, over the past week, gone on an onslaught against

those manufacturing illicit cosmetics and selling them at kiosks, night mar kets. bazaars and beauty parlours.

Their findings confirm the fear of

many who suspect that while these sellers claim that their products are home-made and do not contain haz-ardous substances, many have actually been importing in bulk cosmetics substances from unknown sources in China, Thailand and South Korea.

The raiding party also found, on the premises raided, barrels of sus-pect creams and chemicals, many of which had just arrived from China

The large-scale raids have led to the discovery that many of these sellers and manufacturers have been conning their customers into believ-ing that they are the original man-ufacturers of the cosmetics they sell, when that is not the case.

Some have gone to the extent of using photographs of "chemists" hunched over samples in laborato ries, concocting their own beauty for

mulas, in their marketing campaigns. The *New Straits Times* was told that throughout this year's aggressive enforcement against these illicit traders, the focus would be on those selling unnotified cosmetics out of business premises and kiosks.

"The crackdown has begun in sev eral states, including Selangor, Penang, Terengganu and Johor," said the source.


A massive crackdown to clear the market of killer beauty products has been carried out in the city centre over the past few days.

dul Wahab, said the operations, involving 22 officers, followed the promise that it would do everything within its power to protect the public from being exposed to harmful cos-

metics sold by unscrupulous, profit-driven businesses. The department has been receiving a steady stream of complaints

from consumers adversely affected by the tainted cosmetics.

The operations were preceded by over a month's surveillance and intel-

gathering by the enforcement team. In the first phase of enforcement the enforcers raided 10 premises and seized RM2 million worth of illicit products.

"Among complaints we received were on premises in Jalan Klang Lama that were selling illegal cos-

"We raided an office and nine stores in a shopping complex... Many of these sellers push their products online, either in retail or bulk.

"Our team went undercover as in terested buyers... They (the sellers) lure unsuspecting consumers by convincing them of their products' ef fectiveness and claim that the products are cheaper than those in the market." Dr Zainudin told the NST.

The raids were a continuation of operations by the ministry involving clinics and beauty parlours, including those selling unnotified products and providing illegal injection services

The items seized included buckets and barrels of night cream, unapproved whitening injection products and sex stimulants.

The cases will be investigated un-

der Regulation 7(1)(a) of the Control of Drugs and Cosmetics Regulations 1984 Act for possessing unregistered products and Regulation 18(a)(1) of the same act for possessing unno-tified cosmetic products.

Individuals found guilty of both charges could be sentenced under Section 12(1) of the Sales of Drug Act 1952, which provides a fine of not 1862, which provides a title of flot exceeding RM25,000 or imprison-ment not exceeding three years. For companies, the punishment falls under Section 12(2) of the same

act, involving a fine of not exceeding RM50,000.

This newspaper had, last month, front-paged a series of investigative reports on the rampant sale of harmful cosmeties, including those sourced from China, Thailand and the Philippines

These products, which the NST picked up from night markets, markets, bazaars and social media plat-forms, and sent for lab analyses, were found to contain dangerous sub-stances, including hydroquinone and mercury.

The team then approached the

ministry's enforcement agencies to rein in not only the sellers, but also doctors who helped administer in-jectable whitening products not ap-

proved by the ministry.

The first raids saw doctors caught red-handed while administering sus pect injectable whitening concoc-

tions into their "patients".

The enforcers also extended their raids to include beauty parlours selling unnotified products and providing beauty injection services.

Nation is successful because we set aside our differences, says Najib

ALAYSIA has come a long way in 60 years due to the peace, stability and prosperity enjoyed by the 📕 people.

Prime Minister Datuk Seri Najib Razak said the survival of a country could not be maintained if the people did not set their differences

"Our country is complex due to our diversity and differences in race, religion and belief. But, we are here today because we have managed to set aside our differences."

He said the ability of the country to succeed was once doubted due to its diversity, which

was expected to lead to disputes.
"Sri Lanka has only two communities, but they were involved in a long civil war. Our country was more complex when it was first formed. But, we put aside our differences and reached this stage.

"We tolerate, accept and celebrate our dif-ferences. With these, I believe Malaysia can step forward and become among the top 20 countries in the world in 30 years," he said at the launch of Wisma Ceylonese here yester-

man Datuk Kumarasamy Sittamplam. Najib said it was his responsibility to listen to the wishes of the people in the implementation of a new vision for the nation.

"The new vision must have the sense of belonging and the sense of common ground which say that we belong to the same community.

"Community and nation building is impor-tant. I must listen to the wishes of the people and translate them into actions and policies that can bring the country to greater heights."

Earlier, in **Lukut**, Najib said Malaysians should be grateful as the Goods and Services Tax (GST) here was six per cent compared with India's 23 per cent.

He said the RM41 billion collected from GST would be used to boost education and health-

care, and help state governments. "My good friend Mr Modi (Indian Prime Min

ister Narendra Modi) will implement a threelevel GST, with the highest level at 23 per cent. So, we should not complain." Najib said at the 60th Diamond Jubilee Kelab Bell Belia Tamil Malaysia.

"If GST is abolished, the RM41 billion collected will not go to the government. How can we implement all government projects if there is no source of money? The asked. Najib also commended the Kelab Bell Belia Tamil Malaysia, the oldest association in

Malaysia, for being instrumental in helping the Indian community since 1956.

"The Indian community represents 7.4 per cent of the country's population and the Indians have made immense contributions to the country.

"The government, on its part, will continue to help as we have set up two units at the Prime Minister's Department aimed at solely helping the Indian community.
