# Rakyat diminta terus patuh SOP

**Putrajaya:** Kebenaran diberikan kepada pusat pelancongan dan hiuran, aktiviti riadah serta prasekolah beroperasi mulai hari ini, adalah sebahagian pendekatan negara ini dalam pembukaan semula ekonomi secara terkawal dan tersusun.

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah, berkata penularan kes COVID-19 dalam komuniti negara ini dilihat terkawal, walaupun kerajaan sudah membenarkan beberapa sektor ekonomi dan beroperasi sepuhnya sebelum ini.

Katanya, perkembangan positif berkenaan membuktikan 'pemulihian' negara untuk mengimbangi nyawa rakyat dan mata pencarian sudah bermula dengan pelaksanaan Prosedur Operasi Standard (SOP) yang ditetapkan kerajaan.

"Pematuhan kepada SOP ini pastilah utama dalam memastikan kes COVID-19 di negara ini terus berkurang, memandangkan lebih banyak subsektor akan dibuka esok (hari ini).

"Kerjasama orang ramai amat diperlukan oleh kerajaan bagi me-

mutuskan rantai penularan COVID-19 di Malaysia.

"Justeru, kita berharap orang ramai tidak alpa dengan trend penurunan kes COVID-19 di negara ini.

"Sebaliknya, kita perlu lebih berwaspada serta mematuhi SOP dan mengamalkan langkah pencegahan pada setiap masa.

"Kerjasama semua pihak adalah amat penting untuk kita sama-sama memutuskan rantai penularan jangkitan COVID-19 di negara ini," katanya dalam kenyataan, semalam.

# Tiada jangkitan babit warga asing

Hanya dua kes baru dicatatkan semalam

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**Kuala Lumpur:** Hanya dua kes baru jangkitan COVID-19 dikecaskan di negara ini semalam, selepas mencatatkan angka harian sama pada 10 Jun lalu.

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah, berkata pertambahan dua jangkitan baru itu menjadikan kumulatif COVID-19 di Malaysia kini berjumlah 8,639 kes.

Beliau berkata, pada masa sama, 20 kes pulih sepenuhnya dan dibenarkan keluar wad semalam, menjadikan kes aktif dengan kebolehjangkitan kini 164 kes, termasuk empat dirawat dalam Unit Rawatan Rapi (ICU) dengan satu memerlukan bantuan pernafasan.

"Dua kes baru membabitkan warga tempatan, masing-masing satu kes penularan dalam negara, manakala satu lagi kes import."

"Kes penularan dalam negara itu dikesan di Hospital Kota Belud, Sabah melalui saringan prarujukan yang dijalankan terhadap pesakit. Tiada penularan dalam kalangan bukan warganegara hari ini (semalam)," katanya menerusi kenyataan semalam.

Dr Noor Hisham berkata, tiada pertambahan kematian berkaitan COVID-19 dilaporkan semalam,

menjadikan kumulatif kes kematian COVID-19 di Malaysia kekal sebanyak 121 kes selama 16 hari berturut-turut, mewakili 1.40 peratus daripada jumlah keseluruhan kes.

Mengulas mengenai kes sembuh, Dr Noor Hisham berkata, 20 kes pulih dan dibenarkan discaj semalam, menjadikan kumulatif pulih sepenuhnya 8,354 atau 96.7 peratus daripada jumlah keseluruhan kes.

Katanya, sejak Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan Bersyarat (PKPP) dilaksanakan pada 10 Jun sehingga kini, kumulatif kes harian adalah 303.

"Jika dilihat pada taburan kes harian sepanjang pelaksanaan PKPP, ia dalam lingkungan satu hingga dua angka. Ini membuktikan 'pemulihan' negara sudah bermula.

# Malaysia catat dua kes baharu Covid-19

Kedua-dua kes positif itu melibatkan rakyat tempatan

**K**ementerian Kesihatan Malaysia (KKM) merekodkan dua kes baharu positif koronavirus (Covid-19) semalam, masing-masing melibatkan satu kes import dan penularan tempatan.

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah berkata, kedua-dua kes tersebut membabitkan rakyat tempatan.

"Kes penularan di dalam negara adalah kes saringan prarujukan di Hospital Kota Belud,

Sabah," katanya dalam satu kenyataan di sini semalam.

Menurutnya, pertambahan kes tersebut menjadikan jumlah kumulatif positif Covid-19 meningkat kepada 8,639 kes.

"Oleh itu, jumlah kes aktif dengan kebolehjangkitan Covid-19 adalah 164 kes," katanya.

Beliau berkata, pesakit yang dirawat di unit rawatan rapi (ICU) sebanyak empat kes termasuk seorang yang memerlukan bantuan pernafasan.



# HEALTH D-G REMINDER: STAY VIGILANT

**WHO chief warns that Covid-19 global cases are 'actually speeding up'**

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**T**HE Health Ministry has called on Malaysians not to be complacent with the dwindling new Covid-19 cases in the country.

Instead, the public must remain vigilant and abide by the standard operating procedures (SOPs) as outlined by the ministry and take preventive measures at all times, said Health director-general Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah.

He said with more sectors set to reopen starting today, public co-operation was crucial in the

country's efforts to break the Covid-19 transmission chain.

"To ensure a smooth recovery process, the government has established SOPs for (various) sectors and sub-sectors.

"High compliance of these SOPs is paramount in ensuring that new Covid-19 cases continue to decline," he said yesterday.

On this note, Dr Noor Hisham highlighted World Health Organisation chief Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus's warning, made during a virtual briefing, that Covid-19 global cases were "actually speeding up".

He quoted Ghebreyesus as saying: "We all want this to be over. We all want to get on with our lives. But the hard reality is this is not even close to being over."

Dr Noor Hisham said although most sectors of the economy were reopened and fully operational, the spread of Covid-19 within the community remained under control.

"This proves that the country's

recovery has already begun. Nonetheless, Covid-19 monitoring and surveillance are still ongoing to ensure early detection."

It was reported the government had begun reopening various sectors in stages, including preschools and kindergartens; cinemas and theatres; recreational activities at swimming pools and theme parks from today, along with wedding ceremonies and birthday parties.

On case updates, Dr Noor Hisham said Malaysia recorded two new Covid-19 cases up to noon yesterday, bringing the tally to 8,639 cases nationwide.

He said both cases involved Malaysians, with one locally transmitted and another was an imported case.

"The locally transmitted case was detected during a pre-surgery screening at Kota Belud Hospital in Sabah, while another one, involved a returnee coming back from abroad," he said.

Dr Noor Hisham also said the

number of active cases stood at 164, adding that 20 more patients had recovered and been discharged from hospitals, bringing the current rate of recoveries at 96.7 per cent (8,354 cases).

"Four patients are being treated at the intensive care unit, with one placed on ventilator support. There is no death recorded today, keeping the death toll at 121 (1.4 per cent)," he said.

## Noor Azmi: Two-shift system aims to lighten staff load

**KUALA LUMPUR:** The two shift-system at selected government clinics in the country is meant to lighten the burden of staff at these facilities, says Deputy Health Minister Datuk Dr Noor Azmi Ghazali.

He said there were government clinics operating on extended hours until 10pm.

"The staff might be able to file claims, but they would have less time for themselves and their families," he said yesterday.

He said the shift system was created to ensure that social distancing was observed in the clinics, adding that the system was only implemented in clinics with enough staff.

A survey by the Malaysian Medical Association (MMA) from May 22-28 revealed that 92% of 9,320 Health Ministry employees in various categories disagreed with the new shift system that was being implemented in phases from June 15.

From the survey, 84% said this would increase their workload and 89% said it would increase work-related stress and lead to burnout.

But Dr Noor Azmi said there were no problems with the system and that it had been implemented well.

He told reporters this after attending a cheque presentation ceremony by online shopping platform Shopee to the MMA Foundation (MMAF).

The shopping platform had raised RM699,830 in online donations for front line healthcare workers battling Covid-19 via the Shopee MMA Covid-19 Fund launched in April.

The fund attracted over 32,000 donors over the three-month period since its launch.

"We will work on identifying front line healthcare workers in need of support and ensure that they receive help," said MMAF president Datuk R. Doraisingham Pillai.

## Health DG: War against virus far from over

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**PUTRAJAYA:** The declining number of infections in the country should not lull Malaysians into complacency about the precautions against Covid-19, says Health director-general Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah.

He quoted Dr Tedros Adhanom, the World Health Organisation (WHO) director-general, who said on Monday: "We all want this to be over. We all want to get on with our lives. But the hard reality is this is not even close to being over."

Dr Noor Hisham noted that the pandemic was growing in other countries.

Thus, he said the public must continue to comply with the ministry's Covid-19 standard operating procedure (SOP).

His advice came amid Malaysia recording only two more new infections in the past 24 hours.

One of them just returned from Egypt, while another case was detected at Kota Belud Hospital in Sabah during a health screening.

"Since the recovery movement control order (MCO) was enforced on June 10, there have been a total of 303 cases.

Looking at the daily number of cases, they are only within one or two digits.

"With most economic sectors reopening, the transmission of cases

within the community is under control. This shows that the country is on the road to recovery.

"But the Covid-19 pandemic has not ended. In fact, the number of cases globally has been increasing.

"Hence, the ministry is urging the public not to be complacent despite fewer Covid-19 cases in Malaysia.

"Instead, we must be more vigilant and continue to comply with the SOP and practise preventive measures at all times," Dr Noor Hisham said in a statement yesterday.

On Monday, Senior Minister Datuk Seri Ismail Sabri Yaakob announced that theme parks and pre-schools could resume operations from today, subject to strict

compliance with the SOP.

"Considering that more sub-sectors will be reopening from July 1, it is vital that the public cooperate and adhere to the SOP so that we can break the chain of infections in Malaysia," said Dr Noor Hisham.

Cumulatively, Malaysia has 8,639 Covid-19 cases. Out of that, 8,354 patients or 96.7% have recovered.

The number of Covid-19 deaths has remained at 121 for the 16th day in a row.

There are now 164 active cases remaining at health facilities nationwide.

Four patients are being treated in the intensive care unit with one of them requiring ventilator support.

# Two-shift system to ease workload at health clinics

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**KUALA LUMPUR:** The government has decided to introduce a shift system at health clinics to ease the burden on health workers, said Deputy Health Minister Datuk Noor Azmi Ghazali.

He said the shift system will only be implemented at clinics that are overcrowded, with the aim of creating social distancing among patients.

"Implementation will depend on whether the clinics have enough staff to work two shifts. The problem with overcrowded clinics is that medical staff have to work up to 10pm to clear the backlog of patients."

Noor Azmi said there are times when two or three doctors have to share one examination room to see different patients.

He said such a scenario has to be avoided to enable social distancing

to prevent the spread of the coronavirus.

The shift system will also allow health workers to spend time with their families, he added.

Noor Azmi said the system has been implemented at the Putrajaya health clinic as well as one in Pahang.

The Malaysian Medical Association (MMA) has urged the Health Ministry to conduct a detailed study on the shift system at all government clinics before implementing such a move.

MMA president Dr N. Ganabaskaran said the ministry should first address staffing and infrastructure issues without compromising healthcare, as well as engage more with stakeholders.

He said there was an acute shortage of doctors, nurses and other support staff at healthcare facilities in the country, including government clinics.

Ganabaskaran said under the two-shift system, there will be fewer healthcare workers per shift due to the shortage.

One shift will be from 8am to 5pm and the other from 12.30pm to 9.30pm.

Noor Azmi also advised the public to be more vigilant in observing the standard operating procedures to avoid Covid-19 infection.

"Given that more economic sectors will be opened, social distancing will play an important role in preventing the spread of the

infection," he told reporters after attending the Shopee-MMA Covid-19 fund presentation ceremony yesterday.

He lauded both parties for working together to raise nearly RM700,000 to help frontline health workers.

Ganabaskaran said on top of the RM700,000 the MMA raised with Shopee, it has collected another RM100,000 through a donation drive. The target set by MMA is RM1 million.

Of the sum raised, RM100,000 will be used to build a childcare centre at the Putrajaya Hospital to ease the burden of frontline workers with children.

Another RM100,000 will be spent on tents to create more space at government health clinics.

Ganabaskaran said some of the money will also be used to help frontline health workers facing financial problems and funeral expenses.

## Bill to mitigate Covid-19 impact

**KUALA LUMPUR:** The government is drafting a "Temporary Measures Bill" to mitigate the social and economic impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, International Trade and Industry Minister Datuk Seri Mohamed Azmin Ali said yesterday.

He said that engagement with the public is crucial, an online consultation platform, managed by the Malaysia Productivity Corporation, has been set up.

"As there is a silver lining in every cloud, we should turn a crisis into an opportunity by seizing the emerging trends to mitigate the pandemic and find enablers for quality investment, and fast-track our digitalisation agenda across the board," he said at the launch of the National Productivity Report 2020.

Mohamed Azmin said the government's incremental measures in dealing with the pandemic leading to the latest stage, namely the recovery movement order, have borne productive results and it must not lose sight of the imperatives of protecting lives as well as livelihoods.

This is amid a higher unemployment rate at 3.5%, reflecting the severity of the pandemic which has caused disruption and closures of businesses, cut off the supply chain and resulted in financial losses due to the movement control order.

While business concerns should leverage on technology and innovation, automation and digitalisation should also forge ahead. Employability of the workforce should be enhanced with reskilling and upskilling initiatives urgently initiated to reduce dependency on foreign labour, he added. - Bernama

## Two new Covid cases, no death

**PETALING JAYA:** Only two new cases of Covid-19 were reported as of noon yesterday.

Of the two, one is an imported case.

The Health Ministry also announced in its official Facebook page that there were no fatalities, leaving the death toll at 121.

With the additional cases, there are now 164 active cases while the national tally has reached 8,639.

Of the new cases, one is a Sabahan who was infected locally and the other is a man from Selangor who has just returned from Egypt.

Yesterday, 20 patients were discharged, bringing the total number of those who have recovered to 8,354.

Health director-general Datuk Seri Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said in a statement later that four patients are still in intensive care and one of them requires a ventilator.

He said the nation's recovery from the pandemic has already begun.

"Since the recovery movement control order was put in place on June 10, there has been only 303 new cases.

"The daily increase in the number of cases has remained in the low double or single digits. Most economic sectors have opened and are operating at full capacity, yet the transmission rate is still under control."

Noor Hisham said this proved that the country is already recovering from the pandemic, but stressed this is seen in terms of balancing saving lives and livelihood.

He ended the statement by citing World Health Organisation chief Dr Tedros Adhanom's remark: "We all want this to be over. We all want to get on with our lives. But the hard reality is this is not even close to being over."
