Pemulihian COVID-19

Kluster Bukit Bintang catat satu kes baharu

304 pesakit disaring, tiada risiko penularan kepada masyarakat

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Putrajaya: Kluster Bukit Bintang merekodkan satu kes baharu, menjadikan 11 pesakit COVID-19 dalam kluster itu, setakat semalam.

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah, berkata kes positif dalam kluster berkenaan membabitkan 10 warganegara Bangladesh dan seorang warganegara Malaysia.

"Seramai 304 orang sudah di-

saring, dengan 204 orang bukan warganegara dan 100 warganegara Malaysia.

"Daripada jumlah ini, 293 orang negatif COVID-19. Kes positif baharu ini dikesan hasil daripada saringan ulangan dalam tempoh mereka di pusat kuarantin.

"Mereka masih diasingkan di pusat kuarantin, manakala kes positif COVID-19 dimasukkan ke hospital. Justeru tidak membawa risiko penularan kepada masyarakat," katanya semalam.

Dr Noor Hisham berkata, pi-

haknya masih menyiasat punca jangkitan kluster berkenaan.

Pada 24 Jun lalu, beliau berkata, pihaknya mengenal pasti tiga kluster baharu, iaitu Kluster Bukit Bintang, Kluster Tapak Pembinaan Kuching dan Kluster Kondominium Hulu Langat.

Dalam perkembangan berkaitan, katanya, bilangan kes kebolehjangkitan COVID-19 kini kurang daripada 100 kes, iaitu membabitkan 85 jangkitan.

Dr Noor Hisham berkata, daripada angka berkenaan, tiga membabitkan kes positif baharu, termasuk satu kes import.

Beliau berkata, kes import itu membabitkan seorang warganegara Malaysia, manakala ke-

dua-dua kes penularan tempatan dalam kalangan bukan warganegara.

"Terdapat 62 kes pulih dan dibenarkan discaj pada hari ini (semalam). Jumlah kumulatif kes yang pulih sepenuhnya daripada COVID-19 dan sudah discaj daripada wad ialah 8,437 kes atau 97.6 peratus daripada jumlah kes seluruh kes.

"Sehingga 2 Julai 2020 jam 12 tengah hari, terdapat tiga kes baharu yang dilaporkan, menjadikan jumlah kes positif COVID-19 di Malaysia sebanyak 8,643 kes," katanya.

Dr Noor Hisham berkata, jangkitan dalam negara membabitkan masing-masing satu kes di Wi-





layah Persekutuan, iaitu dalam Kluster Bukit Bintang dan satu kes di Sabah, membabitkan satu kes saringan kes baharu masuk ke lokap di Kota Kinabalu.

Beliau berkata, ada dua kes positif COVID-19 yang dirawat di unit rawatan rapi (ICU) dan memerlukan bantuan pernafasan.

Katanya, tiada kematian sejak 19 hari lalu, menjadikan jumlah kematian akibat COVID-19 di negara ini kekal 121 atau 1.4 peratus daripada jumlah keseluruhan kes.

Kluster Bukit Bintang catat satu kes positif

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah berkata, kes positif itu membabitkan 10 warga Bangladesh dan seorang warga Malaysia.

Menurutnya, setakat ini, seramai 304 orang disaring membabitkan 204 bukan warganegara dan 100 warganegara Malaysia.

“Daripada jumlah ini, 293 orang adalah negatif Covid-19 dan ingin dimaklum-

kan bahawa kes positif baru ini dikesan hasil daripada saringan ulangan dalam tempoh mereka di pusat kuarantin.

“Mereka masih diasingkan di pusat kuarantin, manakala kes positif Covid-19 dimasukkan ke hospital,” katanya, semalam.

Dr Noor Hisham berkata, justeru, ia tidak membawa risiko penularan kepada masyarakat.

Hanya 85 kes terima rawatan

Kuala Lumpur: Sebanyak 62 kes Covid-19 pulih dan dibenarkan discaj, semalam menjadikan jumlah kumulatif sebanyak 8,437 kes atau 97.6 peratus daripada jumlah keseluruhan kes.

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah berkata, terdapat tiga kes baharu dilaporkan sehingga jam 12 tengah hari.

Menurutnya, ini menjadikan jumlah kes positif Covid-19 di Malaysia sebanyak 8,643 kes.

“Oleh itu, jumlah kes aktif dengan kebolehjangkitan Covid-19 kini kurang

daripada 100 kes iaitu 85 kes mereka diasingkan serta diberi rawatan di hospital.

“Daripada tiga kes baharu dilaporkan, satu kes adalah kes import membabitkan warganegara Malaysia mendapat jangkitan di luar negara manakala kedua-dua kes penularan di dalam negara pula bukan warganegara.

“Perincian kes jaungkitan dalam negara dalam kalangan bukan warganegara adalah kes daripada Kluster Bukit Bintang dan satu kes saringan kes baharu masuk ke lokap di Kota Kinabalu,” katanya dalam satu kenyataan, semalam.

Bukti usaha kerajaan termasuk KKM perangi Covid-19 membuatkan hasil

Usah kerajaan termasuk Kementerian Kesihatan Malaysia (KKM) memerangi pandemik koronavirus (Covid-19) yang melanda negara sejak Januari lalu membuatkan hasil apabila hanya 85 pesakit dirawat di hospital.

Ketua Pengarah Kesihatan, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah berkata, daripada jumlah itu, hanya dua pesakit dirawat di unit rawatan rapi (ICU) hospital,

Hanya 85 pesakit masih dirawat

"Kedua-dua pesakit ini memerlukan bantuan pernafasan. Selain itu, tiada kes kematian berkaitan Covid-19 dilaporkan selama 19 hari berturut-turut sejak 14 Jun lalu.

"Justeru, jumlah kumulatif kes kematian Covid-19 kekal 121 kes bersamaan 1.4 peratus daripada jumlah keseluruhan kes," katanya menerusi satu kenyataan semalam.

Menurutnya, hanya tiga kes baharu direkodkan KKM semalam membabitkan satu kes import dan dua kes penularan tempatan.

"Bagaimanapun, kedua-dua kes penularan tempatan itu melibatkan

warga asing di negara ini. "Satu kes dikesan dalam Kluster Bukit Bintang dan satu kes lagi merupakan saringan sebelum dimasukkan ke lokap di Kota Kinabalu, Sabah.

"Pertambahan itu

menjadikan jumlah kes positif Covid-19 adalah 8,643 kes," katanya.

Beliau berkata, sebanyak 62 kes yang telah pulih dan dibenarkan discaj semalam menjadikan jumlah kumulatif kes yang telah pulih sepenuhnya adalah 8,437 kes.

Mengulas lanjut mengenai Kluster Bukit Bintang, Dr Noor Hisham berkata, 11 kes positif Covid-19 dikesan KKM melibatkan 10 warga Bangladesh dan seorang rakyat tempatan.

"Setakat ini, 304 orang telah disaring di mana 204 orang adalah bukan warganegara dan 100 adalah warga tempatan," katanya.

Jangan lalai walaupun kes Covid-19 rendah, pesan PM

PUTRAJAYA - Perdana Menteri, Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin mengingatkan semua pihak agar tidak alpa dan lalai dengan ancaman wabak koronavirus (Covid-19) berikutan trend penurunan jangkitan wabak itu sejak akhir-akhir ini.

Tegasnya, rakyat perlu berwaspada dengan mengambil langkah pencegahan serta mematuhi prosedur operasi standard (SOP) yang ditetapkan setiap masa.

"Ya, perkembangan positif ini sememangnya membuatkan kita sangat teruja dan bangga.

"Namun, jangan pula merasa terlalu selesa," katanya menerusi entri di Facebooknya semalam. Menurutnya, dalam tempoh Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan Pemulihan yang sedang dilaksanakan, semua pihak kini merupakan barisan hadapan.

"Kita semua memikul tanggungjawab yang sangat berat untuk melindungi keluarga, komuniti dan negara daripada Covid-19," katanya.

Beliau turut mengucapkan tahniah kepada petugas barisan hadapan yang masih bertungkus-lumus memerangi Covid-19.

"Saya juga berbangga dengan seluruh rakyat Malaysia atas kerjasama yang sangat baik dalam mematuhi SOP yang ditetapkan," katanya.

18 DAYS OF ZERO COVID-19 DEATHS

PM urges people not to be complacent over drop in new cases to single digit

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MALAYSIA continues to record no death for 18 days straight, with the death toll remaining at 121.

Health director-general Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said no fatality from the virus was reported to the Crisis Preparedness and Response Centre up to noon yesterday.

Malaysia recorded the 121st fatality on June 14, involving a detainee at the Bukit Jalil Immigration Detention Centre.

* On case updates, Dr Noor Hisham said three new cases were recorded yesterday, bringing the tally to 8,643.

He said two cases were locally transmitted involving foreigners, while another one was imported, involving a Malaysian.

"One of the locally-transmitted cases was detected from the

Bukit Bintang cluster during repeated screening at the quarantine centre, and the other one was detected during screening before being sent to the lock-up in Kota Kinabalu."

On active cases, he said the number stood at 85 up to yesterday, and 62 more patients had recovered and were discharged from hospitals, bringing the rate of recoveries at 97.6 per cent (8,437 cases).

"Two patients are being treated at the Intensive Care Unit and two are on ventilator support."

On the status of the Bukit Bintang cluster, he said there were 11 positive cases recorded, including the one tested who positive yesterday, involving 10 Bangladeshis and one Malaysian.

He said 304 people in the cluster were screened, involving 204 foreigners and 100 Malaysians.

"Of the total, 293 tested negative for Covid-19."

He said the cause of this cluster was under investigation.

He said district health offices, together with the police, were tracking down the 620 Persons Under Surveillance whom had yet to undergo the 13th-day Covid-19 test.

"Please take note. Action can be taken against those found violating requirements under the House Surveillance Order (HSO). The offenders can be

slapped with a fine or jailed, or both."

These 620 were part of the 5,804 people who were discharged from quarantine centres on June 10 and were kept under HSO to complete a 14-day quarantine period. He said the remaining 5,184 people were released from HSO after they tested negative on the 13th day.

Prime Minister Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin congratulated frontliners for their hard work, as well as the people, for working to break the chain of infection in Malaysia.

"*Alhamdulillah*, for the first time yesterday (Wednesday), we logged the lowest daily new Covid-19 cases with one case, which was imported, with no local transmission recorded."

He said the drop in new cases to a single digit had proven the public's seriousness to fight Covid-19 and comply with standard operating procedures.

"Yes, this positive development makes us so excited and proud. But do not let our guard down, otherwise all the efforts to stop the outbreak of Covid-19 will be in vain."

"During this Recovery Movement Control Order phase, we are all frontliners. We have the responsibilities to protect our families, communities and country from Covid-19."

PM proud of achievement in curbing pandemic

PETALING JAYA: Prime Minister Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin has paid tribute to frontliners who have worked tirelessly for months to stem the spread of the pandemic.

Muhyiddin said Wednesday was the first time that Malaysia recorded only one case in a day, which saw no local transmission cases among citizens and foreigners.

"Congratulations and thank you to the frontliners who are still working hard at present to control the spread of Covid-19 in the country.

"At the same time, I'm also proud with every Malaysian for giving good cooperation in terms of abiding with (the) SOP," he said, adding the decreasing rate reflected the society's level of awareness and knowledge about Covid-19.

"Congratulations to Malaysians," said Muhyiddin, adding this showed increasing compliance with the standard operating procedure (SOP).

"Such positive development is making us very excited and proud. But we shouldn't be too comfortable to the extent that efforts in stemming Covid-19 are neglected."

Muhyiddin stressed Malaysians must continue to be vigilant, take preventive measures and always abide by the SOP.

"During the recovery movement control order (MCO), we are all frontliners," he said, pointing out that every Malaysian had the responsibility to protect his or her family members, the community and the country from Covid-19.



"God willing, I'm confident that with the cooperation and commitment of every Malaysian, we will successfully defeat Covid-19."

"I'm proud with all of you. I'm proud to be a Malaysian."

In PUTRAJAYA, Health director-general Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said the number of active Covid-19 cases in Malaysia had dipped below 100 for the first time since early March before the country faced a spike in cases.

Another 62 patients were discharged from health facilities yesterday, which leaves only 85 who are still being treated for the virus.

Since the outbreak began, 8,437 patients have recovered in Malaysia.

"This translates to a recovery rate of 97.6% out of the total number of cases in the country," he said in a statement.

Two patients are in the intensive care unit and both are intubated with ventilators.

Dr Noor Hisham also announced only three additional cases as at noon yesterday while the death toll remains at 121.

Of the three new cases, two are local transmissions involving foreigners and one is an import case of

a Malaysian returning from Singapore.

One of the two local cases is related to the Bukit Bintang cluster while the other was detected during screening of new detainees at a lock-up in Kota Kinabalu.

Dr Noor Hisham said the Bukit Bintang case was found from a repeat test conducted on 293 individuals under quarantine.

"These individuals who initially tested negative remain isolated and there is no risk of them infecting others in the community," said Dr Noor Hisham.

With the addition of that one case, there are now 11 positive cases linked to this cluster.

"The source of infection in this cluster is still under investigation."

Only three new cases reported

PETALING JAYA: The number of new cases of Covid-19 infections remained in the low single-digits yesterday.

Among the three reported as of noon, one came from a cluster found in Bukit Bintang and another was infected in Sabah.

The third patient is a Malaysian who had just returned from abroad, said Health Director-General Datuk Dr Seri Noor Hisham Abdullah.

However, details of which country the man had travelled to were not provided.

With the three additional cases,

the tally now stands at 8,643.

Noor Hisham said there were currently 85 active cases, with two of them in intensive care and requiring the aid of a ventilator to breathe.

Yesterday, 62 more patients were discharged from hospital, taking the number of those who have recovered to 8,437.

It was another day without a fatality, leaving the death toll at 121.

Noor Hisham said with the new case reported in Bukit Bintang, the cluster now has a total of 11 cases - 10 Bangladeshis and a Malaysian.

The Bukit Bintang cluster was first

reported on June 24, when the first 10 cases were detected.

Since then, 304 people in the locality have been screened. Among them are 204 foreigners.

Noor Hisham said among them, 293 tested negative, adding that the additional positive case came to light only after repeated screening while the individual was at the quarantine centre.

The newly infected person is being treated in hospital while the others remain in quarantine.

An investigation is under way to find the source of the infection.
