Only 2 active clusters left

PUTRAJAYA: Only two active Covid-19 clusters remain, namely the Kuala Lumpur construction site and Cheras mall clusters. Both clusters yesterday recorded one new case, respectively. Health director-general, Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said to

date, both clusters had recorded 31 and 25 Covid-19 cases, respectively.

He said no new cases were re-ported from the Seri Petaling cluster. He said 38,708 samples from the Seri Petaling cluster had been tested, of which 2,364 of them were Covid-19 positive.

He said 19,770 students from 370 tahfiz schools and madrasah

and tanny schools and madrasan mationwide had been identified. He said 13,498 samples (68.3 per cent) were taken from them and of the total, 655 tested positive for Covid-19.

He said 96 of the positive cases

(14.7 per cent) had shown Covid-19 symptoms, while 559 (85.3 per-

cent) were asymptomatic.

Dr Noor Hisham said there were no new Covid-19 cases re-ported from the Jalan Othman market area, which was placed under the Enhanced Movement

Control Order (EMCO).

He said to date, 28 cases, including two cases from outside the EMCO area, had been recorded, of which 21 of them involved foreigners.

He said 36,170 Malaysians who had returned home from abroad had been quarantined.
"Of the total, 28,330 have com-

pleted the 14-day quarantine. A total of 365 of them tested pos-

He said Covid-19 screening was also carried out at 350 wet markets nationwide, involving 36,210 traders and workers. A total of 28,385 samples (78.4 per cent) were tested and 258 positive cases (0.9 per cent) were reported.

Dr Noor Hisham said the EMCO placed on Bandar Baru Ibrahim Majid, Johor, ended yesterday, with no new cases being reported

in the past 28 days. He said 193 cases and four fatalities involving those from the area had been recorded.

"The same goes for the Makasar cluster, whose EMCO ended today (yesterday). Nine cases were reported from the cluster, with no deaths

He said the Covid-19 testing capacity stood at 27,233 samples a day, with 23,312 samples (86 per cent) tested at 45 laboratories on Friday.

He also said all 222 members of parliament tested negative for

"Yesterday (Friday) was the last day (for Covid-19 tests for MPs). However, we will do (another round of tests) for one or two more days. Alhamdulillah, none of them tested positive."

The tests were conducted ahead of the opening of the Dewan Rakyat tomorrow. Strict standard operating procedures will be enforced at the Dewan Rakyat, including implementing social distancing, imposing a sin-gle-entry point with thermal scanners and prohibiting visi-

317 Covid-19 cases involve children, infants, says Health D-G

PUTRAJAYA: Up to yesterday, there have been 317 Covid-19 cas-es among children under 12 and infants, with Selangor recording the highest number of cases.

Health director-general Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah yesterday said besides senior cit-izens, children and infants were also part of the high-risk

group.

He said of the 317 cases, 112 cases (35 per cent) involved children aged 4 and below and 22 cases (seven per cent) involved infants. The ministry's data showed hat Selangor recorded the highnumber of Covid-19 cases ing children under 12, with 77 followed by Negri Sembi-8), Johor (46), Kuala and Putrajaya (28) and). Sarawak recorded 23 ng (14), Kelantan (12), Penang (10), Melaka ngganu (seven), Perlis (one) and

snam advised par-

ents, guardians and older family members to be responsible and protect children and infants from

being exposed to the virus.
Parents and guardians, he said,

needed to educate children on good hygiene practices, such as washing their hands regularly with soap and water and wearing face masks in public areas.
"It is important for

us to protect our-selves, our family and the community. Chil-dren can contract the disease from family members who test positive for Covid-19. "Avoid touching

your children once you return home from outside. Adults should shower first, use hand sanitiser or wash their hands before touching their children as they could have been exposed to the virus

He said the risks of children be-

ing exposed to the virus were among the reasons the Health Ministry was concerned about people going back to their home-

towns during the festive season.

Dr Noor Hisham, however, said

there had been no severe cases of Covid-19 or deaths due to the virus among children aged 12 and below.
Children who were infected with the virus, he said, would

usually have a fever.
"We also know that Covid-19 could affect the lungs and cause Noor pneumonia, and chil-bdullah dren could experi-ence the Kawasaki disease syndrome, which is an ill-

ess that causes inflammation in blood vessels.

"These are the symptoms they could have. We are trying to prevent children from getting infected. We hope we can continue to provide good quality care for children who tested positive for Covid-19. We have been doing well, (but) prevention is better than cure."

He said the ministry was mulling to exclude deaths from causes other than Covid-19 infection in its daily death tally.

He said there were deaths due to accidents and other diseases other than Covid-19 that had been reported, but tests done on the deceased revealed that they were also carriers of the virus.

"When we took swabs or conducted tests, the results turned out positive. This was the situation for the 113th death case (reported yesterday). The patient was suffering from lung cancer and was given palliative care at

'She might have contracted the virus from caregivers or visitors. She was brought to the hospital when her health deteriorated.

"She tested positive for Covid-19, although the cause of death was lung cancer."

Another example, he said, was suicide case involving an individual who tested positive for Covid-19.
"Even though it was revealed

later that the deceased had Covid-19, the cause of death was suicide. Currently, all Covid-19 cases are included in the cumulative cases. We are discussing whether to consider Covid-19 or (the actual) cause of death (in recording Covid-19-linked deaths)."

Covid-19-linked deaths), Seventeen new Covid-19 cases were recorded yesterday, bringing the tally in the country to 6,872. There are 1,247 active cases.

Dr Noor Hisham said of the 17

new cases, six were imported.
He also said of the 11 local cases, five involved foreigners.
He said 73 patients were discharged yesterday, bringing the total number of recovered cases to 5,512 or 80.2 per cent. He added that 13 Covid-19 pa-

tients were being treated in the Intensive Care Unit, with five requiring ventilator assistance.

'Children under 12 vulnerable'

Health DG tells parents to follow SOP and not to let down guard during Raya

PUTRAJAYA: The Health Ministry has advised parents to keep chil-dren safe in the upcoming Hari Raya break as there are now 317 cases detected in those below the

age of 12.

Of the 317 cases, Health director-general Datuk Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said 112 cases involved children below four years old.

Another 22 infections were found in babies less than one year old.

in babies less than one year old.

"To date, there are no deaths recorded among children under 12 years old," he said during his daily briefing yesterday.

Dr Noor Hisham said children under the age of 12 in Selangor recorded the highest Covid-19 numbers with 77 cases, followed by Negri Sembilan (48), Johor (46), Kuala Lumpur and Putrajaya (28), Sabah (26) and others.

Hence, Dr Noor Hisham said apart from the elderly, children and babies are also in the high-risk groups.

groups.
"Children and babies have to be

"Children and babies have to be protected to ensure that they are not exposed and be infected with Covid-19," he said.

Dr Noor Hisham said parents and guardians of children should tell youngsters about good hygiene practices such as washing their hands with soap and water.

Children are also progrupaged to

Children are also encouraged to wear face mask in public areas,

During the press conference, Dr Noor Hisham also noted that the ministry has so far not seen severe cases in children who have the

cases in children who have the virus in the country.

It is known that the virus affects the lungs, thus resulting in a patient developing pneumonia and blood clots, he said.

In children, he noted that there is a risk of them developing the Kawasaki syndrome, where there is an inflammation of the blood ves-

"These are the symptoms that they can have. The symptoms start with fever and then inflammation of the blood vessels," he said.

There have been foreign news reports about a rare and severe inflammatory syndrome, like the Kawasald disease, that have been detected in children.

The Kawasaki disease is an inflammatory disorder that causes

inflammatory disorder that causes

blood vessels to become inflamed.
"We hope we can continue to
make sure that we can give good
quality care to our children once

they have been diagnosed as Covid-19 positive," he said. Dr Noor Hisham also reminded

families to bathe or at least wash their hands first before touching

their children when they get home.
"This is because we are exposed to the virus that is in the communito the virus that is in the communi-ty. Every time we go home, we are bringing the virus along and through that we can infect the elderly and children," he said. With the festive holiday around

the corner, Dr Noor Hisham urged the public to comply with the stand-

ard operating procedure that has been provided by the ministry to ensure that children and families stay safe from the virus.

Meanwhile, Dr Noor Hisham said there were 17 new Covid-19 cases on Saturday, bringing the total number of infections in the country

to 6,872.
Out of the 17 new cases, he said six were imported while 11 were local transmission.
Five of the 17 infections were detected among foreigners.
Dr Noor Hisham also said that 73 patients were discharged in the same 24-hour span.

He said this meant that 5,512 patients had recovered from Covid-19 in Malaysia since the outbreak

began.
"There are 13 positive Covid-19 cases who are being treated in the intensive care unit and, of that total, five need ventilator support," he

said.
Dr Noor Hisham also said that
one death was recorded, bringing
the death toll to 113.
Separately, Dr Noor Hisham said
more than 750 parliament staff as
well as MPs have been screened for

Up till now, none of them had been found to be infected.





SOP for houses of worship to be finalised

PUTRAJAYA: The standard operat-ing procedure (SOP) related to the opening of non-Muslim houses of opening or non-Musiim nouses or worship during the conditional movement control order (MCO) period will be finalised by tomor-row, says the National Unity Ministry (KPN).

In a statement yesterday, KPN said minister Datuk Halimah Mohamed Sadique had an online meeting with representatives of religious bodies on Friday to discuss in general the SOP proposed by KPN and the Health Ministry.
