Pembiayaan kesihatan perlu cukup untuk semua

APEC wajar rangka hala tuju atasi krisis masa depan

Putrajaya: Sebarang pembiayaan kesihatan yang inovatif, perlu memastikan bahawa ia adalah pelaburan yang mencukupi bagi membiayai pendekatan kesihatan untuk semua.

Menteri Kesihatan, Khairy Jamaluddin, berkata pembiayaan kesihatan yang lebih baik melalui pembiayaan sektor awam yang mencukupi, cekap dan saksama adalah kunci kepada sistem kesihatan yang mampan.

Beliau berkata, pandemik COVID-19 menunjukkan mengenai keperluan untuk memfokus semula ekonomi dan mengutamakan pelaburan dalam sektor kesihatan bagi memastikan sistem kesihatan yang lebih mampan dan berdaya tahan.

"Di peringkat global, COVID-19 telah mengganggu penyampaian perkhidmatan, tenaga kerja kesihatan, sistem maklumat kesihatan, pembiayaan dan tabdir urus kesihatan, serta akses kepada ubat-ubatan dan vaksin.

"Daripada pengalaman ini, ia menunjukkan betapa pentingnya negara anggota APEC untuk menilai semula dan merangka hala tuju yang kukuh dan jelas bagi memastikan kemampunan dan daya tahan sistem kesihatan dalam menghadapi krisis kesihatan masa depan selain menambah baik jaringan keselamatan, terutamanya bagi golongan berpendapatan rendah dan sederhana," katanya.

Forum PHC

Khairy berkata, pembiayaan kesihatan yang lebih baik boleh dicapai melalui penguatkuasaan penjagaan kesihatan primer (PHC).

"PHC adalah penting kerana ia adalah teras kepada semua usaha ke arah perlindungan kesihatan sejagat (UHC) dengan menyediakan penjagaan yang komprehensif dan berterusan melalui rangkaian perkhidmatan kesihatan pelbagai disiplin yang lebih luas.

"Ia adalah cara paling inklusif, berkesan dan cekap untuk melindungi kesihatan orang ramai dan masyarakat," katanya.

Khairy memaklumkan forum kesihatan APEC, bahawa Malaysia kini sedang membangunkan Kertas Putih Kesihatan dengan matlamat untuk mengukuhkan lagi sistem kesihatan negara secara holistik.

"Usaha itu mengiktiraf kepentingan pembiayaan penjagaan kesihatan yang inovatif dalam menuju ke arah penjagaan kesihatan yang mampan dan melangkaui penyampaian penjagaan kesihatan secara langsung selain menangani penentu sosial kesihatan.

"Selain menangani cabaran peringkat populasi seperti masyarakat yang semakin tua dan beban penyakit tidak berjangkit (NCD) serta jurang dalam sistem kami pembiayaan terhad untuk kesihatan dan kurang penggunaan data, inovasi dan teknologi," katanya.

Pada 15 Ogos, Khairy berkata, Kertas Putih Kesihatan yang dijangka dibentangkan di Parlimen pada November harus menjadi pernyataan hasrat kolektif negara tentang bagaimana ia boleh menjadikan sistem kesihatan lebih mampan dan berdaya tahan menerusi pemikiran 'keseluruhan kerajaan' dan 'keseluruhan masyarakat'.

Harap KJ kekal Menteri Kesihatan

Kuala Lumpur: Persatuan Hospital Swasta Malaysia (APHM) berharap Ahli Parlimen Rembau, Khairy Jamaluddin, akan kekal sebagai Menteri Kesihatan selepas Pilihan Raya Umum Ke-15 (PRU-15).

Ahad lalu, Khairy yang sudah tiga penggal menjadi Ahli Parlimen Rembau dan pernah diundi sebagai menteri terbaik sebanyak dua kali menerusi kaji selidik oleh beberapa media tempatan tahun lalu, mengesahkan tidak akan bertanding di kerusi Parlimen itu pada PRU-15.

Lima pakar berpengalaman dicalon bantu HWP

Kuala Lumpur: Persatuan Hospital Swasta Malaysia (APHM) mencalonkan lima pakar berpengalaman mewakili beberapa konglomerat hospital swasta untuk membantu Majlis Penasihat Kertas Putih Kesihatan (HWP).

Presiden APMH, Datuk Dr Kuljit Singh, berkata senarai nama pakar mewakili lima hospital swasta itu sudah diserahkan menerusi satu surat kepada Menteri Kesihatan, Khairy Jamaluddin.

"Mereka yang dicalonkan adalah Ketua Pegawai Operasi (COO) Kumpulan KPJ Healthcare Bhd, Datuk Mohamad Farid Salim;

COO Kumpulan IHH Healthcare Malaysia yang juga Ketua Pegawai Eksekutif (CEO) Gleneagles Hospital Penang, Ivan Loh Ee Hoe.

"Selain itu, Pengarah Urusan dan CEO Kumpulan Columbia Asia, Dr Chan Boon Kheng; CEO Pusat Perubatan Subang Jaya, Bryan Lin Boon Diann; dan Pengarah Kewangan Kumpulan Sunway Healthcare, Chelsea Cheng Chuan Shing," katanya dalam satu kenyataan, semalam.

Dr Kuljit berkata, kelima-lima pakar berkenaan memiliki pengalaman lebih 20 tahun dalam pe-

nurusan hospital swasta, manakala setiap hospital yang diwakili mereka sudah wujud di antara 40 hingga 50 tahun.

Selain itu, katanya, Presiden dan Setiausaha APMH pula akan mewakili beberapa kumpulan hospital kecil dan hospital swasta persendirian buat masa ini.

"Kami menyokong penuh majlis penasihat ini dan lima anggota kami mampu memperkukuh kerjasama antara hospital swasta dengan penyedia perkhidmatan kerajaan.

"Kami berpandangan sistem kesihatan awam dan swasta ke-

tika ini adalah mampan, jika kerjasama lanjut dijalankan dengan nasihat dan maklumat tepat daripada lapangan, khususnya daripada pengurusan hospital swasta," katanya.

Kementerian Kesihatan (KKM) menubuhkan Majlis Penasihat HWP pada 10 Ogos lalu, sebagai sebahagian usahanya menggubal kertas putih untuk melaksanakan reformasi sistem kesihatan negara.

Kertas putih itu akan mengemukakan beberapa cadangan penyelesaian dari segi reformasi penyampaian perkhidmatan, pem-

biayaan, tabdir urus serta organisasi dengan pendekatan berfasa merangkumi tempoh 15 tahun.

Majlis itu memiliki 13 anggota dan dipengerusikan secara bersama bekas Menteri Kesihatan, Tan Sri Dr S Subramaniam dan Pengerusi Kumpulan AXIATA, Tan Sri Shahril Ridza Ridzuan.

Ia dianggotai Profesor dan Pengarah Eksekutif Sunway Centre for Planetary Health, Universiti Sunway, Tan Sri Dr Jemilah Mahmood dan Pengarah di Social Security Research Centre Universiti Malaya (UM), Prof Datuk Dr Norma Mansor.

Jumlah kes yang masih aktif dengan kebolehsangkitan Covid-19 ialah 27,546 kes dan daripada jumlah itu, 94.9 peratus atau 26,154 kes sedang menjalani kuarantin wajib di

rumah.

Sebanyak 1,297 kes bersamaan 4.7 peratus pesakit Covid-19 sedang mendapatkan rawatan di hospital, Pusat Kuarantin dan Rawatan Covid-19 (PKRC) (16) serta unit rawatan rapi (ICU) (79) de-

ngan 43 daripadanya memerlukan alat bantuan pernafasan.

Secara keseluruhannya, kadar penggunaan ICU di seluruh negara di paras 62 peratus, bagaimanapun yang digunakan oleh pesa-

kit Covid-19 adalah 21.3 peratus.

Terdapat empat kematian dilaporkan kelmarin termasuk satu kes meninggal dunia di luar fasiliti kesihatan (BID).

Ia menjadikan hingga ki-

ni sebanyak 36,249 kes meninggal dunia akibat dijangkiti dengan 7,705 kes meninggal sebelum bantuan perubatan dapat diberikan.

Mengenai kes sembuh, terdapat 2,897 kes pulih dicatatkan kelmarin, sekaligus menjadikan jumlah keseluruhan 4,729,147 kes.

New Covid-19 cases continue to decrease with 1,486 infections

KUALA LUMPUR: The country continued to show a slight dip in fresh Covid-19 infections in the last 24 hours, recording 1,486 cases on Monday.

On Sunday, Malaysia recorded 1,904 cases. The new daily cases on Monday bring the cumulative number of Covid-19 cases to 4,792,942 in the country since the pandemic hit.

The Health Ministry's Covid-Now portal reported that of the

new cases, 1,484 were locally transmitted and two are imported.

Kuala Lumpur reported the highest number of fresh Covid-19 infections, with 340 cases, followed by Selangor with 315 and Sabah with 159.

Labuan reported no new cases up to Monday.

The country's number of active cases showed a declining trend, with 27,546 reported on Monday.

Of the cases, 94.9 per cent or 26,154 patients are undergoing home quarantine and 16 are being treated at low-risk quarantine and treatment centres.

Up to Monday, 4.7 per cent or 1,297 patients were hospitalised and 79 people were admitted to the intensive care units (ICU).

Selangor topped the list with the highest number of admissions on Monday, with 73 cases, followed by Sabah with 70 and

Johor with 48.

Currently, 43 patients need ventilator support. The portal reported four Covid-19 deaths, including one brought-in-dead case.

One death was reported each in Johor, Negri Sembilan, Perak and Selangor, bringing the death toll to 36,249 since the start of the pandemic.

The ministry also reported 2,897 patients who recovered

from Covid-19 on Monday, adding to the total of 4,729,147 Covid-19 recoveries in the country.

On Covid-19 booster vaccine shots, 16,221,117 people have received their first booster dose and 474,333 people have received their second booster shot.

Up to Monday, the ministry administered the first booster shot to 530 people and the second booster shot to 1,227 others.

Innovative health financing must ensure sufficient funding investment to meet needs of all, says health minister

ANY innovative health financing should ensure that there is sufficient investment in funding a "Health for All" approach, Health Minister Khairy Jamaluddin said yesterday.

"Better health financing through adequate, efficient and equitable public sector funding is key to a sustainable health system," said Khairy at the virtual opening of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (Apec) Health Financing Forum.

He said the Covid-19 pandemic demonstrated the necessity to realign economies and to prioritise health-related investments to ensure a more sustainable and resilient health system.

Globally, he pointed out, Covid-19 had disrupted the service delivery, health workforce, health information system, health financing and governance, as well

as the accessibility to medicines and vaccines.

Based on this experience, Khairy said, it was vital for Apec members to re-evaluate and chart a strong and clear course to ensure the health systems' sustainability and resilience to face future health crises and improve safety nets, especially for the low- and middle-income groups.

He said better health financing could be achieved through strengthening primary healthcare (PHC).

"PHC is essential as it is at the core of all efforts towards universal health coverage (UHC) by providing comprehensive and continuous care through a much wider range of multidisciplinary health services.

Private hospitals nominate 5 to Health White Paper council

KUALA LUMPUR: The Association of Private Hospitals Malaysia (APHM) has nominated five representatives from private hospital conglomerates to assist the Health White Paper (HWP) advisory council.

Its president, Datuk Dr Kuljit Singh, said APHM supported the council, adding that these five representatives would strengthen the partnership of private hospitals with the government.

"We are of the opinion that the

current public and private healthcare system is sustainable, provided further collaborative efforts can be undertaken but with precise advice and knowledge from the ground, particularly from the private hospital operators," he said in a statement yesterday.

Dr Kuljit said the nominations had been submitted to Health Minister Khairy Jamaluddin.

"All of them have more than 20 years of individual experience in private hospital management. Each of these private hospital groups has been in existence for between 40 and 50 years.

"The president and secretary of APHM will represent the other smaller hospital groups and stand-alone private hospitals till further notice."

The 13-member advisory council, announced by Khairy last week, is co-chaired by former

health minister Tan Sri Dr S. Subramaniam and Axiata Group chairman Tan Sri Shahril Ridzuan.

On a separate matter, Dr Kuljit said the association hoped

Khairy would remain in Parliament and continue as health minister after the 15th General Election.

"His contribution to the country's healthcare has been significant, particularly during the pandemic and currently in the proposed HWP.

"His efforts have augmented the foundation that was built by previous ministers, and his courage to enhance the partnership with private healthcare stakeholders is very commendable.

"This partnership with private hospitals will have the details on how delivering healthcare could be made possible to every citizen with the best mechanism of reimbursement and create sufficient accessibility for early treatment without any disruption to any of the existing public and private healthcare structures."
